## 1. Event Description

This webinar will introduce the concept of an Inclusive Mindset and the new UN DESA eLearning course on Government Innovation for Social Inclusion of People in Vulnerable Situations. The event will feature expert presentations on the topics covered in the eLearning course from Morocco and Sri Lanka along with a detailed introduction to the course. The eLearning course is based on the UN DESA/DPIDG/UNPOG Toolkit on “Government Innovation for Social Inclusion of People in Vulnerable Situations” of the [UN DESA Curriculum on Governance for the SDGs](#).

## 2. Context

“[Transforming our World: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development](#),”<sup>1</sup> emphasizes the core principle of leaving no one behind (LNOB). This agenda aims to promote human rights and address vulnerabilities by 2030, stating that people in vulnerable situations – including children, youth, persons with disabilities, those living with HIV/AIDS, older persons, indigenous peoples, refugees, internally displaced persons, and migrants – must be empowered.

The [Sustainable Development Goals Report 2023](#) highlights the urgent action to build capacity and give meaning to the commitment to leave no one behind. This can be achieved by expanding social protection, creating job opportunities, addressing the education crisis, advancing gender equality, leveraging digital technologies, supporting displaced persons, and including marginalized groups.

The [23<sup>rd</sup> Session of the Committee of Experts on Public Administration \(CEPA\)](#) held last April 2024, emphasized that the pledge to leave no one behind is not only the cornerstone and central promise of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, but is also a core principle of public administration. Achieving the pledge of leaving no one behind and developing people-centered strategies, policies and projects, and institutions with the goal of tackling persistent inequalities will require interministerial cooperation and the involvement of people in vulnerable situations through participatory and accountable approaches.

Moreover, reliable disaggregated data are crucial for effective and coherent policymaking and the monitoring of progress, together with capacity-building efforts to support and empower people in vulnerable situations and public institutions at the regional, national, and local levels. However, the path to peaceful, inclusive, and equitable societies is not without complexities, with global instability, insecurity, and uncertainty presenting challenges.

People in vulnerable situations face barriers to full participation in political, economic, and social life, necessitating government innovation. This includes facilitating access to public services, enhancing the value of these services, using frontier technologies, developing inclusive governance models, and empowering people in vulnerable situations.

The [eLearning course](#) aims to build capacities to promote government innovation for social inclusion of people in vulnerable situations by introducing approaches, strategies, and experiences at the national level. Special emphasis is given to exploring various cases highlighting the importance of empowering people in vulnerable situations and engaging them

in policy design, implementation, and monitoring processes as agents of change. The materials presented and the exercises included are designed for government officials, both national and local government agencies working on government innovation, social inclusion/protection or other relevant fields; schools of public administration and institutes of public management; UN Country Teams; and other relevant stakeholders of government innovation, including civil society organizations, the private sector, and the academia.
